8. SCHEDULE OF PAYMENTS

To consider a schedule of payments and to consider recommending to Full Council that delegated authority be granted to the Policy and Resources Committee to deal with this item in the future **(ENCLOSURE NO. 3)**

The advice from the Internal Auditor was that the Council may delegate authority to the Policy and Resources Committee providing it amends its Financial Regulations and provided that all Councillors agree to that delegation. If there is no unanimity, the change cannot be made.

Also the Council must still have a way of reporting these payments, so that Councillors and the public can see the detail i.e. they must continue to be displayed on the website.

The Council should consider whether the frequency of Policy and Resources Committee meetings and its membership is sufficient to maintain adequate scrutiny and approval of payments and make additional proposals as required.

9. TOWN COUNCIL'S WEBSITE

To agree further action needed to meet transparency requirements.

As part of his annual audit, the Internal Auditor employs a specialist website auditor to review the Council's website against the Local Government Transparency Code and produces a detailed report.

The overall assessment was that the Council was compliant. However it was noted that 'the navigation of the site was with some difficulty' and was rated 8/10 whilst most councils of a similar size rated 8.5/10. The Finance Officer is seeking additional information as to the exact navigation issues and at this stage suggests that any amendments are not treated as a priority since the rating was only slightly below average.

However the Internal Auditor also noted that some features of the website are not being regularly updated as a result of the staff changes and it is suggested that this is given higher priority in the short term. He also commented that the payments list needs to additionally show the net amount (excluding recoverable VAT) and the membership of all Committees should be shown. These issues are being attended to.

10. REVIEW OF EARMARKED RESERVES AND REVIEW OF ELECTION EXPENSES 2019

Almost £90,000 was added to the General Fund at the end of 2017/18 due to underspends in various areas. In particular, there was a large underspend on Events and the budgets for Burntwood Town Strategy, Election expenses and SCAMP maintenance were unspent. It may therefore be appropriate to earmark those sums, as budgeted.

In addition, it may be prudent to earmark further funds for election expenses. The bill for the by-election in Boney Hay and Central ward was £12,925, with the 2018/19 budget being only £5,000. Also, the bill for the previous Council elections in May 2015 was £27,369 **(ENCLOSURE NO. 4 - TO FOLLOW)**.

11. LEASES OF UNITS

To agree that following the expiry of any existing leases a yearly licence be offered to the tenants.

12. SWAN ISLAND ROUNDABOUT

To agree that Lichfield District Council be approached in order to determine if Burntwood Town Council can take over future responsibility for this island.

13. DATA PROTECTION POLICIES (ENCLOSURE NO. 5, 5A, 5B, 5C, 5D, 5E AND 5F)

To consider and approval the Data Protection Policies as attached.

56. APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Councillors Mrs Fisher and Mosson.

57. DECLARATIONS OF INTERESTS AND DISPENSATIONS

None declared.

58. MINUTES

It was suggested by Councillor Pullen that should any Members have any comments to make on the Minutes dated 08 January 2018 then these should be emailed to the SAO.

The following comments have been received:

Councillor Mrs Woodward made reference to Minute No. 52 – Sankey’s Corner: Planters and in particular the SRB in the 80s however Councillor Mrs Woodward has established via Mr Turner that it was early 2000s.

Councillor Mrs Woodward made reference to Minute No. 55 – Draft 2018/19 Budget and in particular the last paragraph where Councillor Mrs Woodward suggested a slight increase. In the interests of completeness, Councillor Mrs Woodward supported the zero increase as Councillor Pullen said that pockets of as-yet unspent funds had been found within the budget.

It was **RECOMMENDED** to Council:

That the Minutes be signed as a correct record subject to be comments being noted.

59. POLICY FOR PURCHASING BY MEMBERS OF THE TOWN COUNCIL

Councillor Mrs Tranter explained how a practice had evolved whereby Members of the Town Council in particular herself had purchased small items so that advantage could be taken of

availability and discounts (the sort of item involved was often associated with Christmas and other events put on by the Town Council).

Councillor Mrs Woodward queried proper accountability/audit trail.

It was **RECOMMENDED** to Council:

1. That a pragmatic approach should be adopted with the Chairman of the Council or Chairman of any relevant Events Committee being authorised to purchase goods up to a maximum of £100.00 on each occasion with reimbursement being made upon receipt of valid receipts.
2. That 1 above be subject to the items to be purchased being preauthorised and therefore the Events Committee determine what items will be needed for forthcoming events.

60. GRANT AID FORM

It was suggested by Councillor Pullen that should any Members have any questions on the grant aid form etc then these should be emailed to the SAO. Councillor Mrs Evans made reference to the new General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) and stated that this needed to be included.

Mr Brown made reference to the presentation evening and how this could be dealt with differently in future (the evening could be in the form of a "show and tell" session whereby organisations can be asked to say a few words or bring some items in.

It was suggested by Councillor Mrs Tranter that the Grant Aid Presentation Evening could be held on 25 January 2019.

The following comments have been received:

Councillor Mrs Evans made reference to Page 2, Point 17, Enclosure 3 – Guidance Notes and asked that the word "gant" be amended to "Grant".

Councillor Mrs Evans made reference to Page 5, Point 2e, Enclosure 3 – Application Form and in particular that the new General Data Protection Regulation comes into operation on 25 May 2018 and therefore this needs amending.

Councillor Mrs Evans stated that the Town Council need to be aware of the implications of the new General Data Protection Regulation as it may well make a difference to Grant Aid forms and in particular how and what data etc is retained by the Town Council. Councillor Mrs Evans stated that this was not strictly anything to do with this agenda, but it was an opportunity to highlight it and for the Councillor Pullen, as Leader of the Town Council and officers to look at what needs to happen, as time is running out.

It was **RECOMMENDED** to Council:

1. That the Grant Aid Forms as submitted be approved subject to the comments made by Councillor Mrs Evans being incorporated.

2. That a presentation evening be arranged for Friday 25 January 2019 when those receiving verified grants can take part in a "show and tell" session.

61. REFURBISHMENT OF OMCC: WINDOWS

Councillor Mrs Tranter informed Members that the first Task and Finish Group meeting to deal with the proposed works (including the refurbishment of windows) at the OMCC had been arranged to take place at 9:00 am on Friday 02 March 2018. The Group would include Councillors Pullen, Mrs Tranter and Ennis.

Councillor Mrs Evans stated that the Minority Group's representative was in fact Councillor Mrs Woodward with Councillor Ennis as substitute. Councillor Mrs Woodward stated that she was unable to attend the meeting scheduled for 02 March 2018.

Councillor Mrs Woodward stated that she still felt that the Town Council still needed to bottom out the question "on how to promote it, how it is to be used, what is the OMCC for/to be in the short term, medium term and long term".

Mr Brown stated that terms of reference could be set at the first meeting as ongoing repairs was only one aspect of the OMCC.

Councillor Pullen stated that he felt that no conclusive/firm business case for the refurbishment of the OMCC windows had been put forward.

Councillor Mrs Woodward **RECOMMENDED** that delegated authority be given to Councillor Pullen as Chairman of the Policy and Resources Committee and Leader of the Town Council.

Councillor Mrs Evans made reference to a timeline in respect of the refurbishment works etc. Councillor Pullen stated that he felt that it was difficult to access as long term however would not want to come to "end of term" without undertaking some of the works.

Councillor Mrs Evans stated that she would have made comments on the window replacement programme, but in view of the fact the Task and Finish Group is due to meet tomorrow, she did not think it was appropriate to do so now.

It was **RECOMMENDED** to Council:

That the Task and Finish Group meet on a regular basis with a standing item being put on the Policy and Resources Committee Agenda.

62. DEMENTIA FRIENDLY

Mr Brown stated that he had undertaken some website research and that the SAO would be meeting with Jessica Knight, Dementia Friendly Communities Officer for the West Midlands on Friday 09 March 2018 to ascertain:

- What can the Town Council do at the OMCC?
- What can/should the Town Council do with external organisations/businesses?
- Is there any funding and/or resources available to support the Town Council?

- Should the Town Council start with one area of Burntwood i.e. Sankey's Corner and then expand or should it deal with the Burntwood area as a whole?

Councillor Mrs Tranter stated that she had received an email relating to Tamworth becoming a dementia friendly town and it was suggested that Councillor Mrs Tranter forward this email to Mr Brown in the hope that the Town Council could link in somehow.

Councillor Mrs Evans made reference to Councillor Mrs Woodward's previous suggestion that the Town Council could be working in partnership with the BBC (Shop Burntwood) group and asked if any contact had yet been made or are the Town Council waiting until we are further forward.

It was **RECOMMENDED** to Council:

That a verbal report be made to Council after the meeting on 09 March 2018.

COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE LEVY (CIL)-PARISH MEANINGFUL PROPORTION

Lichfield District Council have advised that Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) funds from developments in the Parish of Burntwood have been identified and the details are set out below:

- 16/00882/FUL Land Adjacent 82 Sycamore Road, Burntwood, Staffordshire, WS7 4RR
- 16/00457/FUL Land Adj 65 Rugeley Road, Chase Terrace, Burntwood, Staffordshire, WS7 1AG
- 16/00537/FUL 50 Springhill Road, Burntwood, Staffordshire, WS7 8UL
- 17/00557/FUL Land Adjoining 58 Learn Drive, Burntwood, WS7 9JG
- 16/00581/FUL Land Formerly Known As 1, Hill Street, Burntwood, Staffordshire
- 16/00629/FUL 114 High Street, Chasetown, Burntwood
- 16/01201/FUL 126 High Street, Chasetown, Burntwood

The District Council are required to pass on a proportion of the Community Infrastructure Levy funds to the Parish Council in that area. That is what is known as the “meaningful proportion” and is calculated at 15% of the total CIL amount received excluding surcharges and interest. The total amount that Burntwood Town Council has received is £7,545.93.

The Community Infrastructure Levy is intended to be used to help fund infrastructure to support the development of an area rather than making an individual planning application acceptable in planning terms which is the purpose of Section 106 monies.

The money can be spent on the provision, improvement, replacement, operation or maintenance of infrastructure or anything else that is concerned with addressing the demands that development places on an area.

The money has to be spent on capital projects and it must be spent within five years from receipt i.e. April 2023.

RECOMMENDED

That consideration of this item be deferred until after the May 2019 elections so that the new Council can consider how to spend any CIL monies received within any policies that it wishes to adopt.

Information & Data Protection Policy

Introduction

In order to conduct its business, services and duties, Burntwood Town Council processes a wide range of data, relating to its own operations and some which it handles on behalf of partners. In broad terms, this data can be classified as:

- Data shared in the public arena about the services it offers, its mode of operations and other information it is required to make available to the public.
- Confidential information and data not yet in the public arena such as ideas or policies that are being worked up.
- Confidential information about other organisations because of commercial sensitivity.
- Personal data concerning its current, past and potential employees, Councillors, and volunteers.
- Personal data concerning individuals who contact it for information, to access its services or facilities or to make a complaint.

Burntwood Town Council will adopt procedures and manage responsibly, all data which it handles and will respect the confidentiality of both its own data and that belonging to partner organisations it works with and members of the public. In some cases, it will have contractual obligations towards confidential data, but in addition will have specific legal responsibilities for personal and sensitive information under data protection legislation.

The Parish Council will periodically review and revise this policy in the light of experience, comments from data subjects and guidance from the Information Commissioners Office.

The Council will be as transparent as possible about its operations and will work closely with public, community and voluntary organisations. Therefore, in the case of all information which is not personal or confidential, it will be prepared to make it available to partners and members of the Parish's communities. Details of information which is routinely available is contained in the Council's Publication Scheme which is based on the statutory model publication scheme for local councils.

Protecting Confidential or Sensitive Information

Burntwood Town Council recognises it must at times, keep and process sensitive and personal information about both employees and the public, it has therefore adopted this policy not only to meet its legal obligations but to ensure high standards.

The General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) which became law on 25 May 2018 and will, like the Data Protection Act 1998 before them, seek to strike a balance between the rights of individuals and the sometimes, competing interests of those such as the Parish Council with legitimate reasons for using personal information.

The policy is based on the premise that Personal Data must be:

- Processed fairly, lawfully and in a transparent manner in relation to the data subject.
- Collected for specified, explicit and legitimate purposes and not further processed in a manner that is incompatible with those purposes.
- Adequate, relevant and limited to what is necessary in relation to the purposes for which they are processed.
- Accurate and, where necessary, kept up to date.

- Kept in a form that permits identification of data subjects for no longer than is necessary for the purposes for which the personal data are processed.
- Processed in a manner that ensures appropriate security of the personal data including protection against unauthorised or unlawful processing and against accidental loss, destruction or damage, using appropriate technical or organisational measures.

Data Protection Terminology

Data subject - means the person whose personal data is being processed.

That may be an employee, prospective employee, associate or prospective associate of BTC or someone transacting with it in some way, or an employee, Member or volunteer with one of our clients, or persons transacting or contracting with one of our clients when we process data for them.

Personal data - means any information relating to a natural person or data subject that can be used directly or indirectly to identify the person.

It can be anything from a name, a photo, and an address, date of birth, an email address, bank details, and posts on social networking sites or a computer IP address.

Sensitive personal data - includes information about racial or ethnic origin, political opinions, and religious or other beliefs, trade union membership, medical information, sexual orientation, genetic and biometric data or information related to offences or alleged offences where it is used to uniquely identify an individual.

Data controller - means a person who (either alone or jointly or in common with other persons) (e.g. Parish Council, employer, council) determines the purposes for which and the manner in which any personal data is to be processed.

Data processor - in relation to personal data, means any person (other than an employee of the data controller) who processes the data on behalf of the data controller.

Processing information or data - means obtaining, recording or holding the information or data or carrying out any operation or set of operations on the information or data, including:

- organising, adapting or altering it
- retrieving, consulting or using the information or data
- disclosing the information or data by transmission, dissemination or otherwise making it available
- aligning, combining, blocking, erasing or destroying the information or data, regardless of the Technology used.

Burntwood Town Council processes **personal data** in order to:

- fulfil its duties as an employer by complying with the terms of contracts of employment, safeguarding the employee and maintaining information required by law.
- pursue the legitimate interests of its business and its duties as a public body, by fulfilling contractual terms with other organisations, and maintaining information required by law.
- monitor its activities including the equality and diversity of its activities
- fulfil its duties in operating the business premises including security
- assist regulatory and law enforcement agencies

- process information including the recording and updating details about its Councillors, employees, partners and volunteers.
- process information including the recording and updating details about individuals who contact it for information, or to access a service, or make a complaint.
- undertake surveys, censuses and questionnaires to fulfil the objectives and purposes of the Council.
- undertake research, audit and quality improvement work to fulfil its objects and purposes.
- carry out Council administration.

Where appropriate and governed by necessary safeguards we will carry out the above processing jointly with other appropriate bodies from time to time.

The Council will ensure that at least one of the following conditions is met for personal information to be considered fairly processed:

- The individual has consented to the processing
- Processing is necessary for the performance of a contract or agreement with the individual
- Processing is required under a legal obligation
- Processing is necessary to protect the vital interests of the individual
- Processing is necessary to carry out public functions
- Processing is necessary in order to pursue the legitimate interests of the data controller or third parties.

Particular attention is paid to the processing of any sensitive personal information and the Town Council will ensure that at least one of the following conditions is met:

- Explicit consent of the individual
- Required by law to process the data for employment purposes
- A requirement in order to protect the vital interests of the individual or another person

Who is responsible for protecting a person's personal data?

The Town Council as a corporate body has ultimate responsibility for ensuring compliance with the Data Protection legislation. The Council has delegated this responsibility day to day to the Town Clerk.

Diversity Monitoring

Burntwood Town Council monitors the diversity of its employees, and Councillors, in order to ensure that there is no inappropriate or unlawful discrimination in the way it conducts its activities. It undertakes similar data handling in respect of prospective employees. This data will always be treated as confidential. It will only be accessed by authorised individuals within the Council and will not be disclosed to any other bodies or individuals. Diversity information will never be used as selection criteria and will not be made available to others involved in the recruitment process.

Anonymised data derived from diversity monitoring will be used for monitoring purposes and may be published and passed to other bodies.

The Council will always give guidance on personnel data to employees, Councillors, partners and volunteers through a Privacy Notice and ensure that individuals on whom personal information is kept are aware of their rights and have easy access to that information on request.

Appropriate technical and organisational measures will be taken against Unauthorised or unlawful processing of personal data and against accidental loss or destruction of, or damage to, personal data.

Personal data shall not be transferred to a country or territory outside the European Economic Areas unless that country or territory ensures an adequate level of protection for the rights and freedoms of data subjects in relation to the processing of personal data.

Information provided to us

The information provided (personal information such as name, address, email address, phone number) will be processed and stored so that it is possible for us to contact, respond to or conduct the transaction requested by the individual. By transacting with Burntwood Town Council, individuals are deemed to be giving consent for their personal data provided to be used and transferred in accordance with this policy, however where ever possible specific written consent will be sought. It is the responsibility of those individuals to ensure that the Parish Council is able to keep their personal data accurate and up-to-date. The personal information will be not shared or provided to any other third party or be used for any purpose other than that for which it was provided.

The Councils Right to Process Information

General Data Protection Regulations (and Data Protection Act) Article 6 (1) (a) (b) and (e)

Processing is with consent of the data subject, or

Processing is necessary for compliance with a legal obligation.

Processing is necessary for the legitimate interests of the Council.

Information Security

The Parish Council cares to ensure the security of personal data. We make sure that your information is protected from unauthorised access, loss, manipulation, falsification, destruction or unauthorised disclosure. This is done through appropriate technical measures and appropriate policies.

We will only keep your data for the purpose it was collected for and only for as long as is necessary, after which it will be deleted.

Children

We will not process any data relating to a child (under 13) without the express parental/ guardian consent of the child concerned.

Rights of a Data Subject

Access to Information: an individual has the right to request access to the information we have on them. They can do this by contacting the Town Clerk.

Information Correction: If they believe that the information we have about them is incorrect, they may contact us so that we can update it and keep their data accurate. Please contact: Town Clerk.

Information Deletion: If the individual wishes the Parish Council to delete the information about them, they can do so by contacting the Town Clerk.

Right to Object: If an individual believes their data is not being processed for the purpose it has been collected for, they may object by contacting the Town Clerk.

The Parish Council does not use automated decision making or profiling of individual personal data.

Complaints: If an individual has a complaint regarding the way their personal data has been processed, they may make a complaint to the Town Clerk, or the Information Commissioners Office casework@ico.org.uk Tel: 0303 123 1113.

The Council will always give guidance on personnel data to employees through the Employee handbook.

The Council will ensure that individuals on whom personal information is kept are aware of their rights and have easy access to that information on request.

Making Information Available

The Publication Scheme is a means by which the Council can make a significant amount of information available routinely, without waiting for someone to specifically request it. The scheme is intended to encourage local people to take an interest in the work of the Council and its role within the community.

In accordance with the provisions of the Freedom of Information Act 2000, this Scheme specifies the classes of information which the Council publishes or intends to publish. It is supplemented with an Information Guide which will give greater detail of what the Council will make available and hopefully make it easier for people to access it.

All formal meetings of Council and its committees are subject to statutory notice being given on notice boards, the Website and sent to the local media. The Council publishes an annual programme in May each year. All formal meetings are open to the public and press and reports to those meetings and relevant background papers are available for the public to see. The Council welcomes public participation and has a public participation session on each Council and committee meeting. Details can be seen in the Council's Standing Orders, which are available on its Website or at its Offices.

Occasionally, Council or committees may need to consider matters in private. Examples of this are matters involving personal details of staff, or a particular member of the public, or where details of commercial/contractual sensitivity are to be discussed. This will only happen after a formal resolution has been passed to exclude the press and public and reasons for the decision are stated. Minutes from all formal meetings, including the confidential parts are public documents.

The Openness of Local Government Bodies Regulations 2014 requires written records to be made of certain decisions taken by officers under delegated powers. These are not routine operational and administrative decisions such as giving instructions to the workforce or paying an invoice approved by Council, but would include urgent action taken after consultation with the Chairman, such as responding to a planning application in advance of Council. In other words, decisions which would have been made by Council or committee had the delegation not been in place.

The 2014 Regulations also amend the Public Bodies (Admission to Meetings) Act 1960 to allow the public or press to film, photograph or make an audio recording of council and committee meetings normally open to the public. The Council will where possible facilitate such recording unless it is being disruptive. It will also take steps to ensure that children, the vulnerable and members of the public who object to being filmed are protected without undermining the broader purpose of the meeting.

The Council will be pleased to make special arrangements on request for persons who do not have English as their first language or those with hearing or sight difficulties.

Disclosure Information

The Council will as necessary undertake checks on both staff and Members with the Disclosure and Barring Service and will comply with their Code of Conduct relating to the secure storage, handling, use, retention and disposal of Disclosures and Disclosure Information. It will include an appropriate operating procedure in its integrated quality management system.

Data Transparency

The Council has resolved to act in accordance with the Code of Recommended Practice for Local Authorities on Data Transparency (September 2011). This sets out the key principles for local authorities in creating greater transparency through the publication of public data and is intended to help them meet obligations of the legislative framework concerning information.

“Public data” means the objective, factual data on which policy decisions are based and on which public services are assessed, or which is collected or generated in the course of public service delivery.

The Code will therefore underpin the Council’s decisions on the release of public data and ensure it is proactive in pursuing higher standards and responding to best practice as it develops.

The principles of the Code are:

Demand led: new technologies and publication of data should support transparency and accountability

Open: the provision of public data will be integral to the Council’s engagement with residents so that it drives accountability to them.

Timely: data will be published as soon as possible following production.

Government has also issued a further Code of Recommended Practice on Transparency, compliance of which is compulsory for parish councils with turnover (gross income or gross expenditure) not exceeding £25,000 per annum. These councils will be exempt from the requirement to have an

external audit from April 2017. Burntwood Town Council exceeds this turnover but will nevertheless ensure the following information is published on its Website for ease of access:

- All transactions above £100
- End of year accounts
- Annual Governance Statements
- Internal Audit Reports
- List of Councillor or Member responsibilities
- Details of public land and building assets
- Draft minutes of Council and committees within one month
- Agendas and associated papers no later than three clear days before the meeting

DOCUMENT RETENTION AND DISPOSAL POLICY

1. Introduction

- 1.1 The Council accumulates a vast amount of information and data during the course of its everyday activities. This includes data generated internally in addition to information obtained from individuals and external organisations. This information is recorded in various different types of document.
- 1.2 Records created and maintained by the Council are an important asset and as such measures need to be undertaken to safeguard this information. Properly managed records provide authentic and reliable evidence of the Council's transactions and are necessary to ensure it can demonstrate accountability.
- 1.3 Documents may be retained in either 'hard' paper form or in electronic forms. For the purpose of this policy, 'document' and 'record' refers to both hard copy and electronic records.
- 1.4 It is imperative that documents are retained for an adequate period of time. If documents are destroyed prematurely the Council and individual officers concerned could face prosecution for not complying with legislation and it could cause operational difficulties, reputational damage and difficulty in defending any claim brought against the Council.
- 1.5 In contrast to the above the Council should not retain documents longer than is necessary. Timely disposal should be undertaken to ensure compliance with the General Data Protection Regulations so that personal information is not retained longer than necessary. This will also ensure the most efficient use of limited storage space.

2. Scope and Objectives of the Policy

- 2.1 The aim of this document is to provide a working framework to determine which documents are:
 - Retained – and for how long; or
 - Disposed of – and if so by what method
- 2.2 There are some records that do not need to be kept at all or that are routinely destroyed in the course of business. This usually applies to information that is duplicated, unimportant or only of a short-term value. Unimportant records of information include:
 - 'With compliments' slips
 - Catalogues and trade journals
 - Non-acceptance of invitations
 - Trivial electronic mail messages that are not related to Council business
 - Requests for information such as maps, plans or advertising material
 - Out of date distribution lists
- 2.3 Duplicated and superseded material such as stationery, manuals, drafts, forms, address books and reference copies of annual reports may be destroyed.
- 2.4 Records should not be destroyed if the information can be used as evidence to prove that something has happened. If destroyed the disposal needs to be disposed of under the General Data Protection Regulations.

3. Roles and Responsibilities for Document Retention and Disposal

- 3.1 Councils are responsible for determining whether to retain or dispose of documents and should undertake a review of documentation at least on an annual basis to ensure that any unnecessary documentation being held is disposed of under the General Data Protection Regulations.
- 3.2 Councils should ensure that all employees are aware of the retention/disposal schedule.

4. Document Retention Protocol

- 4.1 Councils should have in place an adequate system for documenting the activities of their service. This system should take into account the legislative and regulatory environments to which they work.
- 4.2 Records of each activity should be complete and accurate enough to allow employees and their successors to undertake appropriate actions in the context of their responsibilities to:
- Facilitate an audit or examination of the business by anyone so authorised.
 - Protect the legal and other rights of the Council, its clients and any other persons affected by its actions.
 - Verify individual consent to record, manage and record disposal of their personal data.
 - Provide authenticity of the records so that the evidence derived from them is shown to be credible and authoritative.
- 4.3 To facilitate this the following principles should be adopted:
- Records created and maintained should be arranged in a record-keeping system that will enable quick and easy retrieval of information under the General Data Protection Regulations
 - Documents that are no longer required for operational purposes but need retaining should be placed at the records office.
- 4.4 The retention schedules in Appendix A: List of Documents for Retention or Disposal provide guidance on the recommended minimum retention periods for specific classes of documents and records. These schedules have been compiled from recommended best practice from the Public Records Office, the Records Management Society of Great Britain and in accordance with relevant legislation.
- 4.5 Whenever there is a possibility of litigation, the records and information that are likely to be affected should not be amended or disposed of until the threat of litigation has been removed.

5. Document Disposal Protocol

- 5.1 Documents should only be disposed of if reviewed in accordance with the following:
- Is retention required to fulfil statutory or other regulatory requirements?
 - Is retention required to meet the operational needs of the service?
 - Is retention required to evidence events in the case of dispute?
 - Is retention required because the document or record is of historic interest or intrinsic value?

- 5.2 When documents are scheduled for disposal the method of disposal should be appropriate to the nature and sensitivity of the documents concerned. A record of the disposal will be kept to comply with the General Data Protection Regulations.
- 5.3 Documents can be disposed of by any of the following methods:
- Non-confidential records: place in waste paper bin for disposal
 - Confidential records or records giving personal information: shred documents
 - Deletion of computer records
 - Transmission of records to an external body such as the County Records Office
- 5.4 The following principles should be followed when disposing of records:
- All records containing personal or confidential information should be destroyed at the end of the retention period. Failure to do so could lead to the Council being prosecuted under the General Data Protection Regulations.
 - the Freedom of Information Act or cause reputational damage.
 - Where computer records are deleted steps should be taken to ensure that data is 'virtually impossible to retrieve' as advised by the Information Commissioner.
 - Where documents are of historical interest it may be appropriate that they are transmitted to the County Records office.
 - Back-up copies of documents should also be destroyed (including electronic or photographed documents unless specific provisions exist for their disposal).
- 5.5 Records should be maintained of appropriate disposals. These records should contain the following information:
- The name of the document destroyed
 - The date the document was destroyed
 - The method of disposal

6. Data Protection Act 1998 - Obligation to Dispose of Certain Data

- 6.1 The Data Protection Act 1998 ('Fifth Principle') requires that personal information must not be retained longer than is necessary for the purpose for which it was originally obtained. Section 1 of the Data Protection Act defines personal information as:

Data that relates to a living individual who can be identified:

- a) from the data, or
- b) from those data and other information which is in the possession of, or is likely to come into the possession of, the data controller.

It includes any expression of opinion about the individual and any indication of the intentions of the Council or other person in respect of the individual.

- 6.2 The Data Protection Act provides an exemption for information about identifiable living individuals that is held for research, statistical or historical purposes to be held indefinitely provided that the specific requirements are met.
- 6.3 Councils are responsible for ensuring that they comply with the principles of the under the General Data Protection Regulations namely:

- Personal data is processed fairly and lawfully and, in particular, shall not be processed unless specific conditions are met.
- Personal data shall only be obtained for specific purposes and processed in a compatible manner.
- Personal data shall be adequate, relevant, but not excessive.
- Personal data shall be accurate and up to date.
- Personal data shall not be kept for longer than is necessary.
- Personal data shall be processed in accordance with the rights of the data subject.
- Personal data shall be kept secure.

6.4 External storage providers or archivists that are holding Council documents must also comply with the above principles of the General Data Protection Regulations.

7. Scanning of Documents

7.1 In general, once a document has been scanned on to a document image system the original becomes redundant. There is no specific legislation covering the format for which local government records are retained following electronic storage, except for those prescribed by HM Revenue and Customs.

7.2 As a general rule hard copies of scanned documents should be retained for three months after scanning.

7.3 Original documents required for VAT and tax purposes should be retained for six years unless a shorter period has been agreed with HM Revenue and Customs.

8. Review of Document Retention

8.1 It is planned to review, update and where appropriate amend this document on a regular basis (at least every three years in accordance with the *Code of Practice on the Management of Records* issued by the Lord Chancellor).

8.2 This document has been compiled from various sources of recommended best practice and with reference to the following documents and publications:

Purpose

- 1.1 This policy supports the controlled storage and transfer of information by Councillors and all employees, temporary staff and agents (contractors, consultants and others working on behalf of the council) who have access to and use of computing equipment that is owned or leased by Burntwood Town Council.
- 1.2 Information is used throughout the council and is sometimes shared with external organisations and applicants. The use of removable media may result in the loss of the ability to access information, or interference with the integrity of information, which could have a significant effect on the efficient operation of the council and may result in financial loss and an inability to provide services to the public.
- 1.3 It is therefore essential for the continued operation of the council that the availability, integrity and confidentiality of all storage devices are maintained at a level which is appropriate to the council's needs.
- 1.4 The aims of the policy are to ensure that the use of removable storage devices is accomplished with due regard to:
 - 1.4.1 Enabling the correct data to be made available where it is required
 - 1.4.2 Maintaining the integrity of the data
 - 1.4.3 Preventing unintended consequences to the stability of the computer network
 - 1.4.4 Building confidence and trust in data that is being shared between systems
 - 1.4.5 Maintaining high standards of care towards data and information about individual parishioners, staff or information that is exempt from disclosure
 - 1.4.6 Compliance with legislation, policies or good practice requirements

2 Principals

- 2.1 This policy sets out the principles that will be adopted by the council in order for material to be safely stored on removable media so that the risk of loss or corruption to work data is low.
- 2.2 Removable media includes but is not limited to:

USB memory sticks, memory cards, portable memory devices, CD/DVDs, diskettes and any other device that transfers data between systems or stores electronic data separately from email or other applications.
- 2.4 Any person who intends to store council data on removable media must abide by this Policy. This requirement devolves to Councillors, employees and agents of the

council, who may be held personally liable for any breach of the requirements of this policy.

- 2.5 Failure to comply with this policy could result in disciplinary action.

3 Advice and Assistance

- 3.1 The Clerk will ensure that everyone that is authorised to access the council's information systems is aware of their obligations arising from this policy.
- 3.2 A competent person should be consulted over any hardware or system issues. Advice and guidance on using software packages should be also sort from a competent person.

4 Responsibilities

- 4.1 Clerks are responsible for enforcing this policy and for having arrangements in place to identify the location of all data used in connection with council business.
- 4.2 Users of removable media must have adequate Records Management/Information Security training so that relevant policies are implemented.

5 Incident Management

- 5.1 It is the duty of all employees and agents of the council to not allow storage media to be compromised in any way whilst in their care or under their control. There must be immediate reporting of any misuse or irresponsible actions that affect work data or information, any loss of material, or actual, or suspected breaches in information security to the Clerk.
- 5.2 It is the duty of all Councillors/Employees to report any actual or suspected breaches in information security to the Clerk.

6 Data Administration

- 6.1 Removable media should not be the only place where data created or obtained for work purposes is held, as data that is only held in one place and in one format is at much higher risk of being unavailable through loss, destruction or malfunction of equipment, than data which is routinely backed up.
- 6.2 Where removable media is used to transfer material between systems then copies of the data should also remain on the source system or computer, until the data is successfully transferred to another computer or system.
- 6.3 Where there is a business requirement to distribute information to third parties, then removable media must only be used when the file cannot be sent or is too large to be sent by email or other secure electronic means.

- 6.4 Transferring material to removable media is a snapshot of the data at the time it was saved to the media. Adequate labelling must be undertaken so as to easily identify the version of the data, as well as its content.
- 6.5 Files must be deleted from removable media, or the removable media destroyed, when the operational use of the material has been completed. The council's retention and disposition schedule must be implemented by Councillors, employees, contractors and agents for all removable media.

7 Security

- 7.1 All storage media must be kept in an appropriately secure and safe environment that avoids physical risk, loss or electrical corruption of the business asset. Due to their small size there is a high risk of the removable media being mislaid lost or damaged, therefore special care is required to physically protect the device and the data. Anyone using removable media to transfer data must consider the most appropriate way to transport the device and be able to demonstrate that they took reasonable care to avoid damage or loss.
- 7.2 Virus Infections must be prevented from damaging the council's network and computers. Virus and malware checking software approved by the council, must be operational on both the machine from which the data is taken and the machine on to which the data is to be loaded. The data must be scanned by the virus checking software, before the media is loaded on to the receiving machine.
- 7.3 Any memory stick used in connection with council equipment or to store council material should usually be council owned. However, work related data from external sources can be transferred to the council network using memory sticks that are from trusted sources and have been checked using current anti-virus software.
- 7.4 The council will not provide support or administrator access for any non-council memory stick.

8 Use of removable media

- 8.1 Care must be taken over what data or information is transferred onto removable media. Only the data that is authorised and necessary to be transferred should be saved on to the device.
- 8.3 Council material belongs to the council and any equipment on which it is held should be under the control of the council and not available to be used for other purposes that may compromise the data.
- 8.4 All data transferred to removable media should be in accordance with an agreed process established by the council so that material can be traced.
- 8.5 The person arranging the transfer of data must be authorised to make use of, or process that particular data.

- 8.6 Whilst in transit or storage the data must be given appropriate security according to the type of data and its sensitivity.
- 8.7 Encryption must be applied to the data file unless there is no risk to the council, other organisations or individuals from the data being lost whilst in transit or storage. If encryption is not available, password control must be applied if removable media must be used for the business purpose.

9 Faulty or Unneeded Storage Devices

- 9.1 Damaged or faulty media must not be used. The Clerk must be consulted over any damaged equipment, peripherals or media.
- 9.2 All unneeded or faulty storage devices must be dealt with securely to remove the data before reallocating or disposing of the device.

10 Breach procedures

- 10.1 Users who do not adhere to this policy will be dealt with through the council's disciplinary process.
- 10.2 Where external service providers, agents or contractors breach the policy, this should be addressed through contract arrangements.

11 Review and Revision

- 11.1 This policy will be reviewed annually by the council and revised according to developments in legislation, guidance, accepted good practice and operational use.

12 Employees Guide in Brief

- 12.1 Data and information are valuable and must be protected.
- 12.2 Only transfer data onto removable media, if you have the authority to do so.
- 12.4 All transfer arrangements carry a risk to the data.
- 12.5 Run the virus checking programme on the removable media each time it is connected to a computer.
- 12.6 Only use approved products for council data.
- 12.7 Activate encryption on removable media wherever it is available and password protection if not available
- 12.8 Data should be available for automatic back up and not solely saved to removable media.

- 12.9 Delete files from removable media, or destroy the media, after the material has been used for its purpose.

Social Media and Electronic Communication Policy

The use of digital and social media and electronic communication enables the Parish Council to interact in a way that improves the communications both within the council and between the council and the people, businesses and agencies it works with and serves.

The council has a website and uses email to communicate. The council will always try to use the most effective channel for its communications. Over time the council may add to the channels of communication that it uses as it seeks to improve and expand the services it delivers. When changes occur this Policy will be updated to reflect the new arrangements.

Communications from the council will meet the following criteria:

- Be civil, tasteful and relevant;
- Not contain content that is knowingly unlawful, libellous, harassing, defamatory, abusive, threatening, harmful, obscene, profane, sexually oriented or racially offensive;
- Not contain content knowingly copied from elsewhere, for which we do not own the copyright;
- Not contain any personal information.
- If it is official council business it will be moderated by either the Chair/Vice Chair of the Council or the Clerk to the Council;
- Social media will not be used for the dissemination of any political advertising.

Parish Council Website

Where necessary, we may direct those contacting us to our website to see the required information or we may forward their question to one of our Councillors for consideration and response. We may not respond to every comment we receive particularly if we are experiencing a heavy workload.

Parish Council email

The Clerk to the Council has their own council email address (ceo@burntwood-tc.gov.uk). The email account is monitored mainly during office hours, Monday to Friday, and we aim to reply to all questions sent as soon as we can but please note that the Clerk works part-time (currently 25 hours per week).

The Clerk is responsible for dealing with email received and passing on any relevant mail to members or external agencies for information and/or action. All communications on behalf of the council will usually come from the Clerk, and/or otherwise will always be copied to the Clerk. All new emails requiring data to be passed on, will be followed up with a Data consent form for completion before action is taken with that correspondence.

Internal communication and access to information within the council

The council is continually looking at ways to improve its working and the use of social media and electronic communications is a major factor in delivering improvement.

Councillors are expected to abide by the Code of Conduct and the Data Protection Act in all their work on behalf of the council

As more and more information becomes available at the press of a button, it is vital that all information is treated sensitively and securely. Councillors are expected to maintain an awareness of the confidentiality of information that they have access to and not to share confidential information with anyone. Failure to properly observe confidentiality may be seen as a breach of the council's Code of Conduct and will be dealt with through its prescribed procedures (at the extreme it may also involve a criminal investigation).

Members should also be careful only to cc essential recipients on emails, i.e. to avoid use of the 'Reply to All' option if at all possible but of course copying in all who need to know and ensuring that email trails have been removed.
